قرر ما يلي:

المادة (1): تعتمد معايير حقيبة الأدوية الإسماعيلية المرفقة بهذا القرار.

مناظير الجهاز الهضمي، مركز علاج نفسي.

• الوحدات التخصصية:

وحدة صحية متنقلة، مركز خدمات الرعاية الصحية المنزلية.

• دور رعاية صحية طويلة الأمد:

Standards of Emergency Medications Kit

Purpose

- 1.1** To ensure minimum emergency medications are available within MOHAP licensed health facilities and assure uniformity of emergency medication Kit.
- 1.2** Guide and familiarize staff on emergency medication Kit and its functions.
- 1.3** This standard applies to Medical, Nursing and pharmacy staff.

Scope

- 2.1.** All private MOHAP licensed health facilities mentioned below that are authorized to maintain registered emergency medications aligning with facility's scope and based on patient needs, safety, urgency, satisfaction and high quality of care.
- 2.2.** These Standards are applied to:
 - 2.2.1. Outpatient healthcare facilities:**
 - 2.2.1.1.** General Medicine Clinic, General Dental Clinic, Specialized Clinic, Specialized Dental Clinic, School Clinic, Nursery Clinic, Medical Center, Fertility Center, Dialysis Center, Sleep Disorders Diagnosis and Treatment Center, Oncology Treatment Center, Gastrointestinal Endoscopy Center, Psychotherapy Center)
 - 2.2.2. Specialized units:**
 - 2.2.2.1.** Mobile Health Unit, Home Healthcare Services Center.
 - 2.2.3. Long term healthcare facilities:**
 - 2.2.3.1.** Nursing Home, Palliative Care Home, Treatment and Living Support Home.

Definitions and Abbreviations

- 3.1. **Emergency medications:** Medications that are immediately available for use in emergency situations, critical cases and life-threatening conditions to the patient.
- 3.2. **Healthcare Professional:** is an authorized and licensed person by the MOHAP to practice any of the healthcare professions in the Emirates.
- 3.3. **Health Facility:** The permitted health care organization to provide health examinations for patients and help in diagnosis, treatment, nursing or admission for cure and recovery or any other related medical procedures relating to treatment or post treatment rehabilitation.
- 3.4. **Registered Drug:** A registered medicine by MOHAP permitted to be marketed in the United Arab Emirates (UAE).
- 3.5. **Secured place:** It's a limited access place to specific persons or to be reachable (easy accessed) for only healthcare professionals in the facility.
- 3.6. **MOHAP:** Ministry of Health and Prevention
- 3.7. **UAE:** United Arab Emirates
- 3.8. **ENT:** (Ear, Nose & Throat) Department
- 3.9. **EDK:** Emergency Drug Kit
- 3.10. **AED:** Automated External Defibrillator
- 3.11. **BLS:** Basic Life Support

Standard Statement

- 4.1. The facility shall maintain an Emergency Medication Kit contents of which shall be determined in consultation with the Medical Director, Director of Nursing and the pharmacist as applicable, and it shall be in accordance with facility policies and procedures.**
- 4.2. The kit shall be readily available and shall be kept sealed.**
- 4.3. All medications in the kit shall be properly labeled.**
- 4.4. Each facility needs to establish a process for managing Code Blue/ emergency situations within their facility. An emergency medication kit and portable AED shall be readily available in an identified and well communicated area, to meet any emergencies in non-patient care areas such as roof top, parking area and similar areas. Each facility is responsible to perform an assessment to determine the number of AEDs required for non-clinical areas, purchase and fix these AEDs in the identified non-clinical areas.**
- 4.5. An inventory of the contents of the Emergency Medication Kit shall be attached to the outside of the kit.**
- 4.6. The Emergency Medication Kit should be stored in a secure place in appropriate temperature and humidity range as per the manufacturer recommendation.**
- 4.7. The nurse or a trained healthcare professional must record the date the Emergency Drug Kit was checked, the lock number and the initials of the nurse sealing the kit.**
- 4.8. The Emergency Medication Kit must contain a list of the contents (both brand & generic name), dosage, quantity of each item and expiration date. Medication expiration dates**

should also be checked on a monthly basis and after use by a pharmacy staff member and replaced accordingly.

4.9. Health facilities licensed by MOAHP must meet the minimum Mandatory Emergency

Medications requirements in the emergency kit are, as follows:

4.9.1. Outpatient Polyclinics Emergency Medications (Appendix (1)).

4.9.2. Outpatient Dental Clinics Emergency Medications (Appendix (2)).

**4.9.3. Other Standalone Outpatient categories (Dermatology, ENT, Ophthalmology, Etc.)
(Appendix (3)).**

4.9.4. Mandatory Emergency Medications for Hospitals (emergency department).

**4.10. Medical, dental and nursing staff must be BLS certified minimally and have a process to
conduct regular drills at least once every three months to ensure that the staff is prepared
and ready for such emergencies. The record of the drills shall be kept available for review
during MOHAP auditing sessions.**

**4.11. Each clinic is required to establish a process to monitor the compliance for having all the
required emergency items that are checked on a monthly basis.**

4.12. Each clinic is responsible for monitoring and managing expiry dates of emergency items.
